The World Health Organization (WHO) in Poland extends its heartfelt gratitude to you and your local community for your unwavering commitment to public health. We commend the dedication and proactive measures taken by your team to safeguard the health of your local communities.

As April unfolds, we are reminded of the vital significance of Immunization Week, celebrated globally and regionally. This year, European Immunization Week, in conjunction with World Immunization Week, highlights the life-saving power of vaccines to protect individuals of all ages from vaccine-preventable diseases. Vaccines have eradicated smallpox, nearly eliminated polio, and significantly reduced the burden of diseases like measles, diphtheria, and tetanus.

Despite these successes, hundreds of thousands of children in the European Region still miss out on the protection these vaccines offer each year. Additionally, far too many older adults remain unreached by life-saving vaccines, such as those against influenza and other preventable illnesses. Gaps in immunization coverage persist, particularly in urban and underserved areas within the cities. Furthermore, disinformation and fake news about vaccines, migration and socio-economic disparities create challenges to achieving universal immunization coverage. These gaps expose communities to preventable outbreaks, undermine economic stability, and threaten the health security of all residents.

The recent surge in pertussis cases in Poland highlights the broader issue of vaccine-preventable diseases (VPDs) and underscores the critical role of vaccinations in public health. Studies indicate that declining vaccination rates correlate with increased pertussis cases. Similarly, the rise in measles cases points out gaps in immunization coverage. Waning immunity, delayed booster doses, and populations with uncertain vaccination status contribute to outbreaks. The rise in VPDs serves as a stark reminder of the importance of maintaining strong immunization programs and
